The birth of Jesus was a time of great joy because He would be the Lamb of God, and His coming brought about salvation to all. You know, man's sin is really the greatest grablem forms by the g

the greatest problem facing humanity.

Our greatest problem is not failed health. Mr. Ben Sasse, a former U.S. Senator, recently announced that he had been diagnosed with advanced pancreatic cancer. In his announcement, he said, "I've got less time than I'd prefer." I thought that was a remarkable way to put it. There are some that have less years on this earth than they would prefer, and there are others who do not have the health that they would prefer. But great health is not humanity's greatest need.

Wealth is not humanity's greatest need. Even the Lord said to his disciples, "For ye have the poor with you always." (Mark 14:7) Good people, yea, even great people experience lean years financially in their life. I would take your mind back to Genesis 39 where the Pharaoh of Egypt ruled the most powerful country on the planet. Yet, even he would be subjected to seven lean years that would have brought about grand famine and extermination of so many of his friends and families had it not been for the promises and presence of the Almighty God that directed Joseph.

Leanness and hardship would be the entire existence of Christ. For surely the Lord would say, "The foxes have holes, and the birds of the air have nests; but the Son of man hath not where to lay his head." (Matthew 8:20) You'll find that the sons of Zebedee had boats, and they had a dad, Zebedee, that cared for them. No doubt they had a home, a house, a business, and sustenance of life. Matthew, another disciple of Christ and the namesake of the first of the New Testament gospels, was a tax collector which no doubt supplied the needs of his life. Peter had a home and a wife. In fact, if we study the life and times of Jesus Christ, I think the greatest wealth that you could attribute to Christ was his outer garment that he wore. Wealth and health are not the greatest needs of humanity. <u>Man's sin debt is the greatest need facing all mankind</u>. All humanity is separated from God because of this debt. If I can make an analogy here, just as this world was in darkness politically and theologically at the time of Christ's birth, so the heart of men today is in darkness. It is why we can speak of the glorious light of Christ. He is light, and in Him is no darkness at all. He is light, and His light is the life of man. These are the promises we find over and again. And that is why the comparison is made in the New Testament between the kingdom of darkness and the kingdom of Christ's

marvelous light.

The Lord Jesus, in His incarnation, was born to become sin for us that knew no sin. He himself did no sin, but rather, He paid our sin debt. His sacrificed allowed us to be redeemed. Jesus purchased us out of the darkness of this world and promoted us into the glorious presence of the Almighty God. Truly, we can say, "Behold, what manner of love the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the sons of God." (1 John 3:1)

The book of Jude was written to those who are preserved in Christ Jesus. Jude wrote to exhort them that they should "earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints." This is the true faith which has been the bulwark of saints throughout the ages... the bold faith of Old Testament prophets, the "unfeigned faith" of young Timothy, a "Hebrews 11" kind of impossible faith.

1) True faith is unchanging in the face of false doctrine. "For there are certain men crept in unawares...ungodly men, turning the grace of our God into lasciviousness,

crept in unawares...ungodly men, turning the grace of our God into lasciviousness, and denying the only Lord God, and our Lord Jesus Christ. I will therefore put you in remembrance..." Jude v. 4-5.

2) True faith is unchanging in changing times. "Woe unto them! For they have gone in the way of Cain, and ran greedily after the error of Balaam for reward, and perished in the gainsaying of Core. These are murmurers, complainers, walking after their own lusts; and their mouth speaketh great swelling words, having men's persons in admiration because of advantage" Jude v. 11&16.

3) True faith is unchanging because it rests in the person of Jesus Christ and the eternal grace of God "Now unto him that is able to keep you from falling, and to

eternal grace of God. "Now unto him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy" Jude v. 24. I am reminded of a line from the Swedish hymnist, "More secure is no one ever than the loved ones of the Savior.'

Praise the Lord for true faith in the God Who never changes!
